SALE CATEGORIES

- Cow/calf pairs must have natural calf at side. Pairs considered one lot.
- Cows must be 5 years old or younger.
- Bulls must be born on or after 1/1/13 through 4/30/14
- Embryo lots are permitted.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

All cattle must meet the Michigan Beef Expo health requirements before check-in time. All sale cattle must have negative test results for Bovine Viral Diarrhea (BVD) and all bulls must pass a Breeding Soundness Exam in order to sell.

GENETIC TESTING

MAA requires sale consignments that are potential carriers of AM, NH or CA be tested for any known lethal genetic defect for which there is a commercial test available. Test results **MUST** be available and provided when entries are submitted. The consignor is responsible for the cost of this testing. If the animal is confirmed as a carrier, it will not be cataloged. All other cattle must be free by pedigree for any known lethal genetic defect for which there is a commercial test available. If you are unsure of the status of your consignments, please call the American Angus Association at 816-385-5500. To discuss issues related to genetic testing procedures, please contact Casey Jentz, AAA Regional Manager at 608-234-1998.

DUES AND ENTRY FEES

All consignors must be current members of the Michigan Angus Association before consigning to the Michigan Angus Futurity. If not currently a paid member, please add \$25 for membership dues to your entry fee.

ALL consignors to sales held in conjunction with the Michigan Beef Expo must also be members of the Michigan Cattlemen's Association. For more information regarding this policy, please contact MCA at 517-347-8117.

Entry fee of \$100 per lot is due by February 1, 2015. Entries received after 2/1/15 will be required to pay \$150 per head entry fee.

michigan angus centennial



On October 3, sixteen members of the Michigan Angus Association enjoyed an in-depth and behind the scenes look at Certified Angus Beef (CAB).

CAB is headquartered in Wooster, Ohio and the members took part in a special visit to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of

the Michigan Angus Association. It was also a special time for many of the participants to reconnect with several CAB staff who have Michigan roots and/or ties to Michigan, including Mark McCully, Deanna Scrimger Walenciak, Danielle Foster and Geoff Bednar.

CAB is a unique stand-alone subsidiary of the American Angus Association, whose mission is to increase demand for registered Angus cattle through a specification-based, branded beef program to identify consistent, high quality beef with superior taste. CAB is considered the premium beef brand in the world and celebrated its 8th consecutive year of record volumes. During the 2014 fiscal year 880 million pounds of CAB products were sold to consumers throughout the United States and internationally. CAB is currently sold in 46 countries. Mark McCully, Vice-President of Production reported good news for Angus producers. Approximately \$50 million was paid back to cattlemen in grid-based premiums as reported by packers back to CAB.

The CAB Education & Culinary Center, opened in February 2012 was the hub of the visit. It includes industrial kitchens, multiple meeting space, dining areas and a meat lab. The center is capable of hosting multiple groups for hands-on learning and promotional events

Dr Phil Bass, corporate meat scientist, gave participants a live view of a CAB carcass and perspective of the 10 science based specifications.



Dr. Phil's passion and excitement to educate consumers, producers, suppliers and chef was obvious and contagious. Recently named as one of the "40 under 40" in agriculture by Vance Publishing Corporation, he is passionate about his work and developing new ideas. His knowledge, passion and excitement will drive success throughout the CAB team as they work towards identifying new and innovative ways to utilize larger carcasses.

One of the goals of CAB is to bring value-added, convenience products to consumers.

Brett Erickson, director of the brands value-added product line shared samples of the CAB deli roast beef that Midwestern's can find in local Meijer stores. This high end deli product contains no soy fillers and delivers a healthy, delicious eating experience. Erickson also presented CAB convenience items that are either currently on the market regionally or are in the development stage of being marketed.



Visitors were treated to a tour of the CAB office building which displays an array of signs and posters from past marketing campaigns, original logo designs and photos of the key people behind the conception of CAB. The office is proud to display the Saddle & Sirloin portraits of Louis M. "Mick" Colvin and Fred Johnson, two of the driving forces behind the establishment and vision of the CAB branded program.

Chef Tony Biggs served a noon-time meal fit for a king or queen. Participants enjoyed an expertly prepared lunch including value added CAB Short Ribs, coleslaw,



caesar salad, roasted root vegetables, fresh green beans, and lumpy mashed potatoes. The entire meal was flavorful, homey and perfect for a rainy fall day in Ohio. Chef Tony also prepared a special cake to help celebrate 100 Years of the Michigan Angus Association.

The afternoon session included an overview of the consumer research data driving the marketing efforts at CAB. The education and marketing team spends countless hours reaching out to all segments of the industry. From providing restaurants with custom menu designs and organizing on-farm tours for chefs to in-store promotions, radio, TV and online media promotions. Deanna Walenciak, director of education, gave the group a preview of the new farm-to-table heritage campaign that will be rolled out by CAB over the coming year.

President John Sticka joined the group to discuss how CAB stays on mission and strategies for continued growth in relevance and economic impact moving forward. Michigan Angus members were encouraged to send questions, concerns or comments back to the organization.
