President's Message

As the new Michigan Angus Association president, in addition to sharing my outlook for Michigan Angus in the new year I'd also like to introduce myself to those members I haven't yet met.

I am proud to say I am Lisa Lutchka of Lutchka Angus, located in Grass Lake, Michigan. (I included Michigan because we do have members in our association that are from out-of-state.) I am an active Angus producer; currently, we calve 40 to 45 registered Angus females, sell seedstock, and freezer beef.

My parents tell me that the first time I saw the Angus cows at the new farm as a 6-month-old I screamed and cried. Maybe it was because I was scared. Or maybe, even then, I loved them so much that it was hard to contain my emotions.

I consider myself fortunate in many ways, but one of the things that I think of most, is the enjoyment of working with Angus cattle, visiting with fellow Angus producers, meeting and encouraging new owners, and encouraging youth in their cattle involvement. It is a shared love of livestock and agriculture that I think of, in general, but specifically of friendships formed by a shared love of Angus cattle when I think of the Michigan Angus Association.

As a five-year-old, I officially showed my first heifer many years ago, and was afforded many opportunities through my involvement in the Michigan Junior Angus Association and later as a member of the adult association. While I was a junior member, family vacations were a trip to the Junior National and I saw a large part of the country I likely would not have seen. As a Michigan junior, my education was supported by both the Michigan and National Angus Auxiliary scholarship programs. I was comfortable at Michigan State University because we interacted with so many MSU personnel while participating in Angus activities. Dr. Ron Nelson, Dr. Harlan Ritchie, Dr. Dave Hawkins, Dr. Maynard Hogberg, Dr. John Shelle, Amos Fox, Pete Sweeney, Ken Geuns, and George Good are a few of the people that quickly come to mind and there are many more.

Ultimately, I chose to attend MSU and pursue an Animal Science degree. I was a member of the Livestock Judging team and have continued to judge since college. My informal career in teaching began young through Junior Angus activities and 4-H when I worked with younger members. My professional teaching career continues at Leslie High School where I teach science. Additionally, I have been either a head or assistant high school track coach for 30 years.

I am happy to be working with Lisa Bohlen, and remember her mentorship and how excited we all were when she won the National Junior Angus Showmanship contest. The memories could fill chapters, but it is sufficient to say, Angus cattle, and people, are a part of me. I treasure the experiences and opportunities, and the people here and gone.

I would love to say that the outlook for Michigan Angus is limitless and amazing. I hope it is. But, honestly, it is hard to say.

Demand for Angus bulls and females is still strong, and I would like to encourage more association membership and fellowship. There are many Angus cattle and Angus breeders in our state, but not everyone is an active association member or a member at all. I would like to encourage anyone who is interested in being involved in leadership to get in contact with a member of the board. Technology offers us many opportunities in terms of communication and a near endless array of selection tools through our national association, but I feel that we need to see each other and communicate in-person. Zooms, conference calls, and online sales cannot replace face-to-face interactions; it is the nature of our business.

We have many challenges in Michigan. Ultimately, our end product is beef, and for many of us, or our customers, there is a shortage of processing facilities in Michigan. We can sell bulls to sire feeder calves, but, as the pandemic showed many of us, our infrastructure for support of beef producers is aging. Active membership is small, I challenge our members to be a part of the association and to bring new people with you. Our membership is largely aging, we have quality young members, but we need to encourage involvement beyond the show ring for youth with Angus cattle. I invite you all to consider consigning at least one head to the Angus sale at the Michigan Beef Expo; there is a demand for your cattle. The consignment form is on page 3.

I look forward to seeing, or talking to, you all. If you want to call to talk cattle or ideas, weekends and after 5 pm are best. I welcome text contact and email messages too. My contact info is listed below.

Southeastern Michigan Assn. Dissolves and Donates Funds to Support Youth Scholarships

The Southeastern Michigan Angus Association was organized more than 65 years ago and then became an official Michigan corporation on July 6, 1973. Over the years several sales were held at the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds in Ann Arbor and then ten consecutive sales were held in Pioneer, OH at the Clark Simmental Farm using Ken Torr as the auctioneer, marketing cattle from Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana. The final sales were held in Grass Lake, Michigan. The association hosted a field day at the Lenawee County Fairgrounds for many years with cattle exhibitors from Michigan and Ohio and co-hosted the Michigan Angus Association Field Day. The association also served as the fiduciary group for registered Angus cattle shown at several county fairs in Michigan and Ohio. Many breeders were active in the association activities and leadership over the years.

In October of 2022, the decision was made by the board of directors to dissolve the association. The remaining funds have been given to the Michigan Angus Auxiliary for scholarship funding to continue supporting our Angus youth.

MSU Extension Beef Ultrasound Service Gets Upgrade

Beef demand is at a 30-year peak, driven primarily by the beef industry's response to the U.S. consumer's craving for high quality beef. However, during this cattle cycle, cattle producers will only strengthen their request for high marbling genetics as the beef supply tightens, making high quality grades even more valuable. Although genomic testing provides useful information on carcass trait breeding values, ultrasound measures of intramuscular fat, ribeye area, and fat thickness, further increase accuracy of expected progeny differences (EPD).

Equipment has been recently upgraded for the MSU Extension Beef Ultrasound Service to a state-of-the-art Exago ultrasound machine, thanks to generous support from the Michigan Alliance for Animal Agriculture. The Exago machine is recommended by the Centralized Ultrasound Processing Laboratory because of its superiority in ranking animals (especially for intramuscular fat), which leads to even greater precision in ranking of animals and therefore greater accuracy of EPD calculation.

Dr. Jerad Jaborek is newly certified by the Ultrasound Guidelines Council and is scheduling ultrasound scanning sessions for registered yearling bulls and heifers. Dr. Jaborek may be reached at 715-451-2035 or by e-mail: jaborekj@msu.edu.

Bull Evaluation... MCA/MSU Bull Evaluation Update

The new bull development facility at Wernette Cattle Co., Remus, MI is working well, and growth has been exceptional for the 90 bulls that were delivered in October. This year, 23 consignors from Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio have joined us for the inaugural test in the new location. Sixteen of those breeders brought 54 outstanding Angus bulls. At the 56-day weight, the following Angus bulls topped the gain list. Yes, those are daily gains of more than 5 lb/day!

INSTRUCTIONS:

Heat oven to 350°F. Combine all ingredients in large bowl, mixing lightly but thoroughly.

Shape ground beef mixture into 12 equal portions. Place into 12-cup standard muffin pan, lightly patting beef mixture to level top. Bake in 350°F oven 19 to 20 minutes, until internal temperature reaches 160°F.

Cook's Tip: Cooking times are for fresh or thoroughly thawed ground beef. Ground beef should be cooked to an internal temperature of 160°F. Color is not a reliable indicator of ground beef doneness.

Remove from oven. Garnish with toppings, as desired. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.

Greek Mini Meatloaves: Add 3 tablespoons chopped Kalamata olives and 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano to base meatloaf ingredients. Bake 22 to 24 minutes, until internal temperature reaches 160°F. Evenly top with crumbled feta cheese. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Serve with prepared tzatziki sauce. Garnish with sliced cucumber, as desired.

Asian Mini Meatloaves: Add 1/4 cup chopped green onions and 1 teaspoon minced fresh ginger to base meatloaf ingredients. Bake 22 to 24 minutes, until internal temperature reaches 160°F. Evenly top with hoisin sauce or teriyaki glaze. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Garnish with chopped peanuts, sliced green onions or chopped cilantro, as desired.

Spanish Mini Meatloaves: Add 1/2 cup finely chopped red bell pepper, 1/4 cup chopped Spanish olives and 1 teaspoon smoked paprika to base meatloaf ingredients. Bake 22 to 24 minutes, until internal temperature reaches 160°F. Evenly top with shredded manchego cheese. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Garnish with sliced Spanish olives, as desired.
